Is hiring an interior designer worth it?

- √ Client Testimonials (Can be found on their website, Houzz, or Google)








Protip

Look for a portfolio that speaks to your sense of style. A good designer will not only know the basic principles of design but how to tailor them to their client's unique tastes. Finding a designer that showcases designs that fit your style can make the entire process a lot easier.

Asking the right questions

You'll find that choosing the right interior designer is a lot like dating. Since you'll be spending a lot of time together, you need to ask the right questions to see if your values and personalities are aligned in addition to understanding the creative vision for the project.





We recommend that you ask potential candidates these questions before ever signing a contract:

- √ How would you describe your design style?
- √ What design services do you offer?
- √ How much do you charge and can you work with my budget?
- √ Who do you have connections with in the industry?
- √ How will you present your design concept and ideas?
- √ Who will be working on my project and how are they selected?
- √ What happens if I don't like the design?

DO: Set a budget for your project and share it in detail with your designer


DON'T: Underestimate the scope and timeline of your project

Designers help clients with space planning and selections. Protip

We suggest allocating about 7-10% of your home's value for interior design expenses as a general rule of thumb. This will give you a design with some midrange products. If you're looking for high-level or luxury design, we recommend budgeting about 25% of your home's overall value.



Getting started with the design process

The first phase is about getting to know you, your lifestyle, and your space. This is the time to review reference photos with your designer that align with your goals, ideas, and overall vision. There will be meetings where you will see fabrics, wallpapers, tiles, and an array of other finishes depending on the scope of your project.

Once the design direction has been solidified, you'll enter the schematic design phase where your designer will start to visualize your space three-dimensionally. As the client, you can expect one or two meetings in this phase to review the furniture selections, window treatments, architectural details, and preliminary floor plans.

The next phase is design development where the designer ensures your project is executed according to plan. There are a lot of moving parts during this phase, and your designer will coordinate with contractors, workmen, and installers to keep track of it all and troubleshoot any issues that arise.

The installation is the final event in the design process. All soft goods, window treatments, and furnishings are installed by the receiving agent they were shipped to and your interior designer.





Protip

The client should expect 6 to 9 months for smallerscale projects, and 9 months to 1 year for larger projects that require construction permits.

Interior Design Glossary

When you begin exploring the world of interior design, it may feel like speaking a whole new language. Here are some of the important terms to add to your design vocabulary.

Bespoke:

Something custom that is made especially for you

Layered:

Building interest through various levels of elements

Tailored:

Something with clean lines that holds up through the test of time

Clean:

A linear and uncluttered style with no frills

Timeless:

design style that stays away from trends to avoid quickly dating

Curated:

Design that incorporates distinct style with a point of view

Lead time:

The time between ordering an item and shipping or delivery

Drop Ship:

Delivery direct to a client's home

Proforma

This means that you're going to pay for the goods before you receive them
